Summer School Begins at Lahser on Monday, June 25, 2012

The Bloomfield Hills School District, along with the summer school staff, is committed to a diverse high school summer program. This year's course work will provide options for high school students who will continue their formal education in courses designed to enhance, advance, or provide make-up credit. Parent and student reasons are varied for selecting an extended study. However, the District and staff reasons stay constant: provide a caring and trusting environment committed to nurturing a passion for lifelong learning. High school students will have an option for credit recovery in all courses required for a high school diploma.

Credit Options

E2020/Virtual courses can be taken for grade advancement, credit recovery, and grade replacement. These online options require students to report to summer school during the first three days of the session and the last week for the final exam period. Students may come to school as necessary for computer use and individual help with a trained E20/20 supervisor.

GRADE REPORTING

Upon the completion of course requirements, grades will be mailed to the student's home and to their home schools. Incompletes will not be given a grade option.,

E2020 courses will be designated with "VL" for grading/transcript purposes.

Please note: It is the student's responsibility to check with his/her home school to be sure that a copy of his/her grade has been received and subsequently recorded on the school transcript. The Bloomfield Hills School District makes no claim as to the transferability of credit earned in summer school to a school outside the District.

All traditional summer school courses must be completed by July 11, and all virtual Summer School courses must be completed by July 16, 2012.

ENROLLMENT

Courses offered will be determined based on sufficient enrollment for each course. Minimum enrollment numbers will be determined by the summer school principal and will be designed to accommodate the needs of students as well as to provide for a solvent program.

ATTENDANCE POLICY FOR HEALTH & PE COURSES

**Due to the condensed nature of summer school
the attendance policy is incorporated in the following statements.**

1. In the event of an absence, parents are required to call the summer school office and leave a message at (248) 341-5702.
2. The office will call home if no call is received by 10 a.m. of that same school day.
 - Tardiness beyond 15 minutes is considered an absence.
 - Because of the number of instructional hours required, there are NO excused absences.
3. Students will lose credit after missing more than one day when taking a 12 day class.
 - Students who lose credit because of attendance may still continue to audit the class.
 - Any student who loses credit because of attendance will not receive a refund.
4. E2020/Virtual Courses ONLY: Students have the option of completing their virtual classes outside of the designated summer school class via the internet. However, students must be in attendance based on their academic progress.

SUMMER SCHOOL BEGINS ON MONDAY, JUNE 25, 2012

Bloomfield Hills Schools will grant credit for virtual courses when the following conditions are met:

- During the school year, students are not eligible to enroll in a virtual course within their seven period schedules if a course with the same content is being taught at a BHS school.
- Virtual courses may not be used to graduate prior to seven semesters.
- Approved virtual courses will be noted on the transcript and designated “VL”.
- Approved virtual courses will count toward the GPA.
- Virtual courses must meet or exceed the NCA standards that are applied to other courses.

E2020 Student/Parent Technology Agreement

I, _____ agree to abide by the requirements listed below:

1. Students are subject to the Bloomfield Hills School Technology Usage policy and Acceptable Use Policy (AUP). An AUP contract, signed by a parent or guardian and student, must be on file.
2. Students will be issued a password account for the duration of the online course. Students will protect their login information and will not share it with others. Students may access their account during their assigned online course period to communicate about online coursework only.
3. Existing school policies on cheating or fraud will apply to online classes.
4. Students will conduct themselves in compliance with the Student Code of Conduct. Inappropriate behavior may result in removal from summer school.
5. Students will be punctual to class and will complete the course by the target date. Students who fail to meet the deadline will not receive credit. Students may work independently through July 16.

The instructor is responsible for student evaluation and will provide final grades according to the district grading scale.

6. **Students will commit sufficient time outside of class to complete all E2020 assignments. One hundred percent of the coursework must be completed in order to take the final exam.**

HEALTH & PHYS ED

HEALTH EDUCATION

Gr. 9-12

-- 1/2 CREDIT EACH SEMESTER --

7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m.24107

Note: It is highly recommended that students complete this required course in the ninth grade. One-half credit in Health is required for graduation.

This course is designed to make students aware of the relationship of lifestyles to their own physical, emotional, mental, and social health. Particular areas of study will include wellness, proper nutrition combined with exercise for weight control, substance abuse prevention, mental and emotional health, first aid and CPR training with automated external defibrillation (AED), stress management, suicide prevention, reproductive health, sexually transmitted diseases, and contraceptive information.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Gr. 9-12

-- 1/2 CREDIT EACH SEMESTER --

7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m.24106

Note: It is highly recommended that students complete this required course in the ninth grade.

This course, required for graduation, encompasses the District's philosophy of physical education. The basic program provides the student with the opportunity to enhance physical well being, refine motor skills, increase knowledge, and improve attitudes and behaviors, which in turn will increase the student's ability to live a more active and healthy life. The purpose of the cardiovascular fitness program will be to identify a base from which cardiovascular fitness may be improved, and to create awareness of the importance of testing and target heart rates. Students will also take part in the Presidential Physical Fitness Tests in which results are compared with nationally-set standards. Each student will be required to run one mile and swim at least one-quarter mile as part of the course requirements.

ALL STUDENTS

Any course that is taken and is required for high school graduation will include an end-of-course assessment. This includes virtual classes. The grade on that exam will count the same percentage towards the semester grade as it does when taken the course during the school year.

SCIENCE

BIOLOGY I - VIRTUAL *E2020

Gr. 9,10,11,12

-- 1/2 CREDIT EACH SEMESTER --

7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (1st semester) 25201

7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (2nd semester) 95201

This is a required laboratory course beginning with the class of 2011 that emphasizes the traditional concepts of cell structure and function, biochemistry, classification, heredity, genetics, evolution, ecology and a survey of the human body systems. Students must demonstrate proficiency to receive credit.

CHEMISTRY - VIRTUAL *E2020

Gr. 10,11,12

-- 1/2 CREDIT EACH SEMESTER --

7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (1st semester)25300

7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (2nd semester) 95300

Prerequisite: Biology or Honors Biology

This is a laboratory course concerned with the fundamental concepts of chemistry. Topics will include atomic theory, periodic table, quantum mechanics, bonding, nomenclature and formula stoichiometry, states of matter, thermodynamics and solutions, acid-base reactions, redox-equilibrium, and introduction to organic chemistry.

ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE - VIRTUAL *E2020

Gr. 9, 10

-- 1/2 CREDIT EACH SEMESTER --

7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (1st semester)25501

7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (2nd semester)95501

This course emphasizes people and their relationship with earth's many different ecosystems. Topics included in this course will focus upon fossil energy, alternate energy, pollution, resources, population, and other related local and national problems.

PHYSICS - VIRTUAL *E2020

Gr. 9,10,11,12

-- 1/2 CREDIT EACH SEMESTER --

7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (1st semester)25401

7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (2nd semester)95401

This is an introductory laboratory course approached from a less mathematical point of view than the other physics courses that are offered. Fewer topics will be covered than in Honors Physics so that more emphasis can be placed on projects and laboratory exercises. The topics covered include motion, Newtonian mechanics, energy conservation, momentum conservation, waves, sound, light, electricity, and magnetism.

LANGUAGE ARTS

WRITING/LITERATURE I - VIRTUAL *E2020

Gr. 9

-- 1/2 CREDIT EACH SEMESTER --

7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (1st semester) 21220

7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (2nd semester) 91220

This course addresses the needs of students at different levels of competency in the areas of composition, literature, grammar, and vocabulary. Writing assignments will stimulate critical thinking and self-expression and reinforce grammatical, mechanical, and vocabulary skills. Literature study concentrates on comprehension, interpretation, and appreciation. Speaking and listening skills are reinforced through formal and informal presentations.

LANGUAGE ARTS

WRITING/LITERATURE II / VIRTUAL *E2020

Gr. 10

-- 1/2 CREDIT EACH SEMESTER --

7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (1st semester)21225
7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (2nd semester)91225

This two-semester course includes the total writing experience, from the beginning thought processes to the final writing of the complete composition. With discussions of significant ideas from literature as the stimulus, assignments are presented in critical analysis, forceful argument, effective persuasion, and clear explanation. Writing assignments reinforce and add to the grammar, mechanics, and vocabulary skills developed in earlier courses. Literature covers four major genres: drama, short story, novel, and poetry.

WRITING AMERICAN LIT / VIRTUAL *E2020

Gr. 10

-- 1/2 CREDIT EACH SEMESTER --

7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (1st semester)21236
7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (2nd semester)91236

Reading materials in this course focus on the study of American literature through the Nineteenth Century. Selections may include *The Crucible*, *The Scarlet Letter*, *Billy Budd*, *Walden*, and poetry of Whitman and Dickinson. Writing assignments will reinforce and add to the grammar, vocabulary, and writing skills developed in previous courses. The second half of the course will focus on Twentieth Century American literature. Paperback books supplement textbook readings. Selections may include *Ethan Frome*, *A Farewell to Arms*, *The Great Gatsby*, *The Grapes of Wrath*, *Glass Menagerie*, *Death of a Salesman*, and such poets as Frost, Sanburg, and e.e.Cummings. Writing assignments will reinforce and add to the grammar, vocabulary, and writing skills developed in previous courses.

MATH

ALGEBRA I - VIRTUAL *E2020

Gr. 9,10,11,12

1/2 CREDIT EACH SEMESTER --

7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (1st semester)23301
7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (2nd semester)93301

Algebra I builds on the increasingly generalized approach to the study of functions and representations begun in the middle grades. This is done by broadening the study of linear relationships to include piece wise functions such as absolute value and greatest integer, systems of equations, formalized function notation and recursive representations, and more.

ALGEBRA II - VIRTUAL *E2020

Gr. 9,10,11,12

-- 1/2 CREDIT EACH SEMESTER --

7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (1st semester)23302
7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (2nd semester)93302

Prerequisite: Algebra I

This course is intended for students who plan to pursue a course of study that requires advanced algebra skills. The student will study in more detail the topics of Algebra I, as well as polynomial, exponential and logarithmic functions, and complex numbers. Trigonometry, plus arithmetic and geometric series and sequences, will also be included as time permits.

GEOMETRY - VIRTUAL *E2020

Gr. 9,10,11,12

-- 1/2 CREDIT EACH SEMESTER --

7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (1st semester)23411
7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (2nd semester)93411

Students will explore the axiomatic development of Euclidean Geometry. Topics of study include congruence and similarity, geometric inequalities, parallel lines, circles, regular polygons, geometric solids, perimeter, area, volume, transformations, and symmetry.

PRE-CALCULUS - VIRTUAL *E2020

Gr. 11,12

-- 1/2 CREDIT EACH SEMESTER --

7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (1st semester)23601
7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (2nd semester)93601

The students will study functions and relations, conic sections, trigonometry, complex numbers polar coordinates, arithmetic and geometric series and sequences, the binomial theorem, logarithms, theory of equations, plus other topics from college algebra.

SOCIAL STUDIES

U. S. HISTORY - VIRTUAL *E2020.....Gr. 10

-- 1/2 CREDIT EACH SEMESTER --

7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (1st semester) 26419
7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (2nd semester) 96419

This course will examine the development, growth, and challenges of our institutions and culture from the period of industrial growth after the Civil War to the present. The course emphasis will be on having students gain an historical, economic, political, and geographic perspective on the United States. Students will develop inquiry and communication skills through selected research, interpretation and critical analysis of primary source material, and civic-centered participation projects while developing an appreciation for the wide variety of human experiences. This two semester course fulfills the state requirement of US History and Geography.

WORLD HISTORY - VIRTUAL *E2020

Gr. 9

-- 1/2 CREDIT EACH SEMESTER --

7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (1st semester)26011
7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (2nd semester)96011

This course takes a global and comparative approach to studying the world, its past, and geography to develop a greater understanding of the development of worldwide events, processes, and interactions among the world's people, cultures, societies, and environment. This course balances the historical, political, economic, and social interactions of people in all regions of our world while emphasizing the development of a variety of academic skills.

AMERICAN GOVERNMENT - VIRTUAL *E2020

Gr. 11

-- 1/2 CREDIT EACH SEMESTER --

7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m.26502

This course is designed to provide each student with the knowledge, skills, and experiences necessary for him or her to take an active and responsible role as an American citizen. This course is an analysis of the form and function of our federal, state, and local governments. Throughout the course, the rights and responsibilities of citizens are stressed. This fulfills the graduation requirement. This one semester course fulfills the state requirement of Civics.

ECONOMICS - VIRTUAL *E2020

Gr. 11-12

-- 1/2 CREDIT EACH SEMESTER --

7:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. 26200

Students will understand how economies function and how to apply the concepts and principles of economics to their lives as individuals and as citizens. The course will emphasize three areas. Microeconomics will look at decisions of the market system based on scarcity, opportunity cost, inflation, unemployment, monetary and fiscal policies, and the Federal Reserve. International economics looks at specialization and trade. Personal finance includes understanding and applying personal financial issues and strategies. This one semester course fulfills the state requirement of Economics.

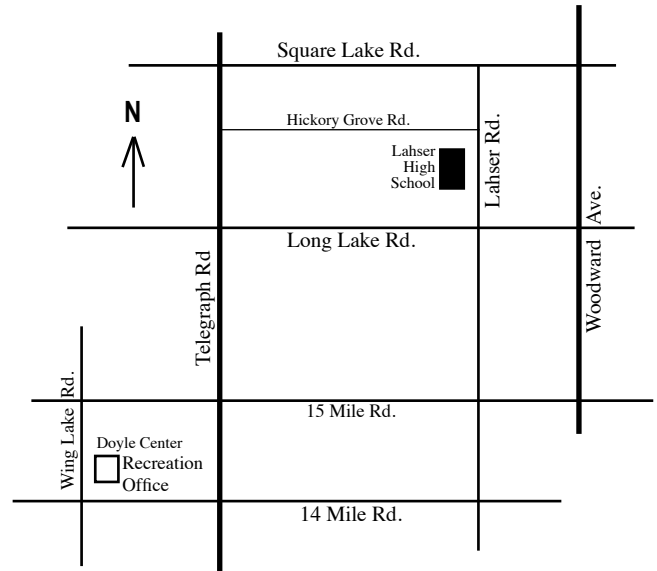
